- Puerto Rico, a U.S. territory, is located in the Caribbean. Puerto Ricans are natural-born U.S. citizens, with nearly 3.4 million U.S. citizens residing on the island.<sup>14</sup>
- Roughly one in two Puerto Ricans are enrolled in the island's Medicaid program.
- Unlike the 50 states and DC, annual federal funding for Puerto Rico is capped, meaning once federal funds are exhausted, the island no longer receives federal financial support for its Medicaid program during that fiscal year. The ACA provided an additional \$6.4 billion one-time allotment, which is expected to exhaust by April 2018, leaving Puerto Rico with an \$877 million shortfall in Medicaid funding.<sup>16</sup>
- Puerto Rico's health care system faces a number of challenges. As young people migrate to the U.S. mainland, seniors now make up a larger share of the population. Health indicators are worse than that of the rest of the United States, and the island's Medicaid program that covers half of the population faces financing difficulties in addition to Puerto Rico's overall fiscal challenges.<sup>17</sup>
- Hurricane Maria has placed additional pressure on an already strained health care system with people in need of immediate medical care. News reports describe power outages throughout the island, many without clean drinking water, and hospitals without electricity or fuel for generators.<sup>18</sup>
